

SEDLSCOMBE is a parish 3 miles north-east of Battle, on the river Brede, on the high road from Hastings to Hawkhurst in Kent, in Staple and Battle Hundreds, Battle Union, Hastings rape, East Sussex, with 2,049 acres, and a population, in 1861, of 714, assessed at £2,613. The benefice is a rectory, value £302 per annum, and in the patronage of the Lord Chancellor. Here the Knights Templars had a preceptory.
